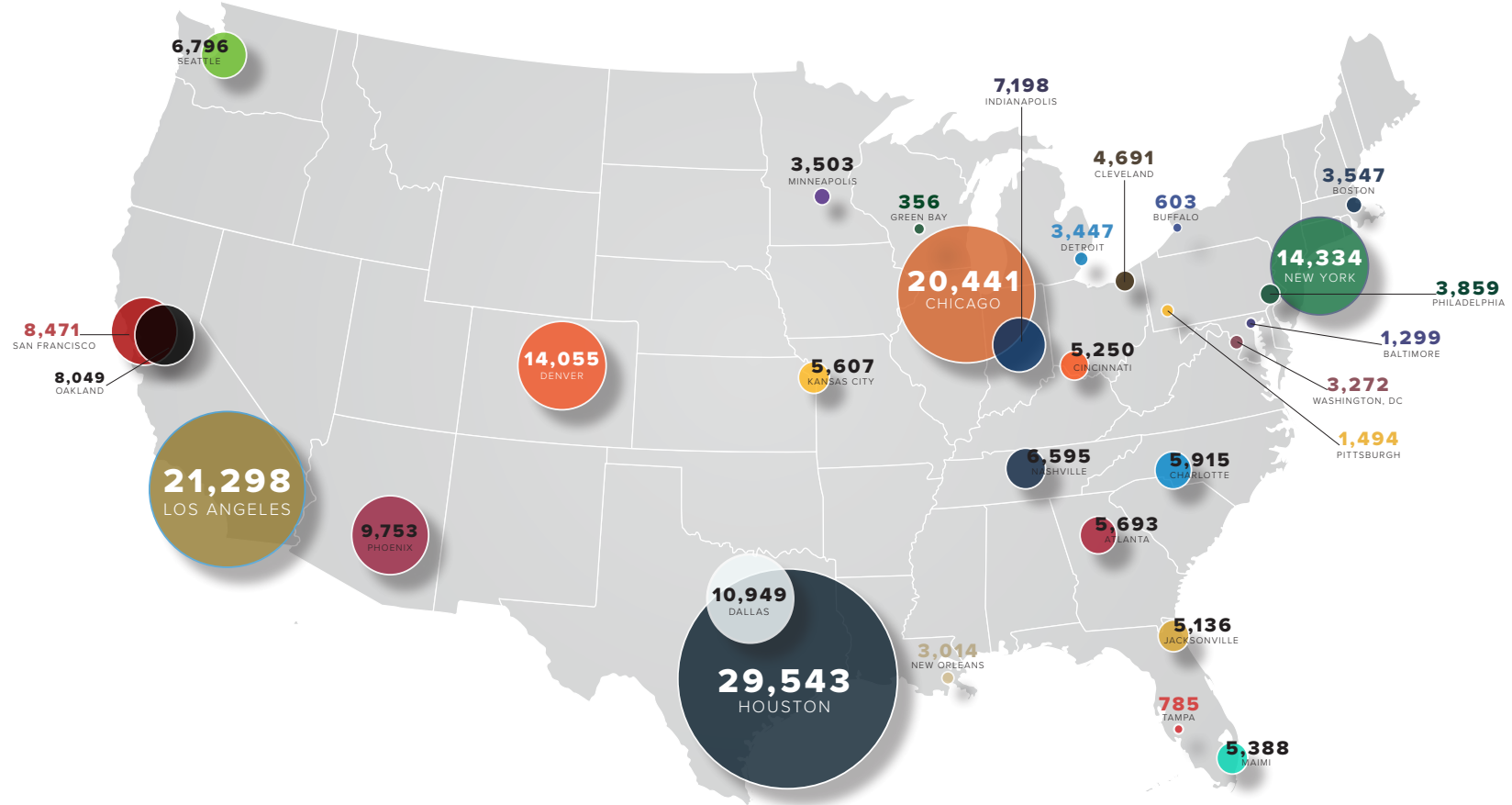


## LIGHT UP PROFESSIONAL FOOTBALL
